INTERNATIONAL Art News

Art Centre Berlin invited Galeria Aniela to exhibit Australian Aboriginal art, in one of the largest International art houses in Europe. The exhibition of 100 paintings, sculpture and films about Australia will run March-June 2007 it will cover 1300 square metres over 3 floors. The Hon. Bob Hawke, a former Australian Prime Minister is the Australian Patron of this project.

This is **for the first time** that Germans will be able to savour a large and important Aboriginal art exhibition. Aboriginal art caused excitement in Paris. The new Musee du Quai Branly was opened by President Jacques Chirac



in June 2006. It is a guide to the level of interest in Europe for these entrancing works. Australian aboriginal art is the world's most exciting form of contemporary art. It is an ancient tradition stretching back more than 40,000 years. It is also a living tradition, having taken its current form, in an explosion of creativity, in the second half of the Twentieth Century. But already many of those painters have passed away. Thus the Berlin exhibition is probably the last chance for anyone alive today to see a large collection of the old masters who founded the Aboriginal Art movement in the 1970s at Papunya in the Australian Central Desert. The exhibition comprises many artists

I created Galeria Aniela to share my passion, to make a difference and to bring joy. Cultures progress because of people visions and high ideals. It takes one person to make a change and create progress. I ask you to support this worthy and exciting project. I append the letters from the Hon. Bob Hawke former Prime Minister who is the Australian Patron of this project.
